- **Dr. Barbeau talked about a visit from a representative from Clemson's new College of Veterinary Medicine visiting our club at FMU**, scheduled for Thur Oct 24th, from 6 7:30pm. More details to come.

 Also, local veterinarians and staff will be attending this informative meeting. Event will be catered by the university.
- Our guest, Kathy McCoy, talked about raising puppies, through Canine Companions, for training for future service dogs. Click <u>HERE</u> for from the club webpage (scroll down to first meeting).
 - We learned that Kathy raises puppies for 18 months, and then they leave to be evaluated by Canine Companions (the organization she volunteers with) to see how they would best be used as service dogs.
 - o <u>Canine Companions</u> uses these trained dogs in 5 areas:
 - 1. Mobility assistance
 - 2. Service dogs with assist (for children or people with cognitive issues that hinders them from actually controlling the dog themselves.
 - 3. Facility dog. For example, they can assist PE teachers with special ed children. They can be used to help children who have been abused or have to be present in the courtroom with lowering anxiety or stress. They also can be used as "hearing dogs" to help with deaf or hearing impaired people.
 - 4.PTSD dogs. They can be used to assist US military veterans with anxiety or problems associated with post-traumatic stress.
 - 5. Breeding dogs. Only the best of the best dogs are included in a breeding program to produce new generations of service dogs. These dogs must pass their initial training through Canine Companions, and also undergo genetic testing to be sure they are healthy.




